Introduction - College Principal

Our vision, mission and values, together with our Shared Expectations, provide a roadmap for our future. This document provides our community with a statement of our philosophy including the vision, mission, values and objectives of the school and how we enact our philosophy.

We asked the whole school community what our purpose is and what our vision for the future could be. We also asked the whole school community what the values of LOVE, EXCEL, ACHIEVE and DREAM (L.E.A.D.) look like in action for us to be successful. And they told us.

Once the vision, mission and values in action were drafted, there was further consultation to confirm the wording reflected the intent conveyed by our community. Finally, a survey of the whole College community was conducted to check the clarity and degree of support for the vision, mission, and values in action. The feedback indicated the vast majority of people understand and fully support the vision, mission, and values. The one-page Shared Expectations were developed to display a summary of the values in action around the school.

This booklet is the result of the consultation and has been developed to communicate our mission, vision, school philosophy, provide clarity about each value, democratic principles, and our child safe declaration. Suggestions are provided for each of the four values to help us get better at demonstrating them. The booklet is intended for use by all members of the St John's College community and those who will join us in the future.

I am inspired by the contribution made by our students, staff, families and the College Board. I was pleased to hear that we all share similar beliefs. I look forward to working with you as we build a strong and vibrant school community.

Vision



Our vision is to educate the whole person, academically, socially, spiritually and morally. Students leave the school with the knowledge, skill and confidence to succeed in their chosen field; to 'walk the right path – Philotimo'.

Philotimo is considered to be the highest of all Greek virtues, the standards for family and social living; the core concept is that of respect and walking the right path. In its simplest form, the term means "doing good", actions that ensure that one's behavior be exemplary and demonstrate one's personality and the manner in which one was raised. Philotimo to a Greek is essentially a way of life. Children are said to display Philotimo when they display unconditional love and respect towards their parents, grandparents and friends, through small actions such as expressions of gratitude for small gifts or random acts of kindness.

Three things you can do today to get better at demonstrating Love

- In conversations, practice summarising what the other person says.
 Genuinely listening conveys respect and you are interested in what they have to say.
- 2. Be kind to someone today. Show them that you care about them and the work they do.
- 3. Ask others to join you in an activity; ask someone you don't normally mix with.

- Having high expectations of ourselves and each other.

Three things you can do today to get better at demonstrating Excel

- 1. Consider one aspect of your work that is very important to you and that you could improve upon. What goal would you set yourself? What measure would you use to know you achieved your goal?
- 2. Make a plan. Your chances of achieving your goal with a plan are much better than without one.
- 3. Check your progress using evidence. Knowing that you have made progress toward achieving your goal is highly motivating.

Three things you can do today to get better at demonstrating Achieve

- 1. Ask an older person about an achievement that is important to them. Ask them how they went about achieving it and why it is important to them. Conversation helps develop curiosity which is important for achievement.
- 2. Think of something that you enjoy at school. What specific steps can you take to improve your results in this area? Whatever your current level, write down three things you can try to help you improve. Try one of them today.
- 3. Think of an achievement that you feel proud of. How did you go about achieving it? Was it easy? What was important for you to do. Use this experience to help you achieve a current goal.

Three things you can do today to get better at demonstrating Dream

- 1. Use a mindmap to help you think about an important dream you have for yourself. By looking at what is related to your dream you may gain insight into how to make your dream come true.
- 2. Use brainstorming to help you think about how to solve a problem you are working on at the moment. You may ask someone to help you brainstorm ideas.
- 3. Reflect on the effort you have made to learn and grow. It is important to know that you have worked hard to achieve your dreams. Today, reflect on what you did and how you can use your learning about yourself to continue to grow.

The Shared Expectations document helps to promote the use of the values in our decisions, communication and actions.


The Shared Expectations are included in key processes such as the development of curriculum.

Leading Values

The Leadership Team and the College Board values a consultative, evidence-based approach to achieving our vision. Our values guide the school's strategic direction, planning, monitoring and evaluation to advance student learning opportunities and outcomes. Our leaders take deliberate actions to lead the use of our values every day.


The Leadership Team and College Board:

- 1. Talk with one another about what each of the values means for the Leadership Team's work; each leader is responsible for doing this for the team/s they lead.
- 2. Consider how each of our leadership styles may come across to others to role model our values effectively.
- 3. Behave and communicate in a way that demonstrates our values each day.
- 4. Are consistent in modelling our values.
- 5. Incorporate our values as a conscious and deliberate part of our decision-making and share our rationale with each other and with our teams.

- 6. Link decisions, communications and behaviour to our values.
- 7. Invite each other to provide feedback, especially when we aren't role modelling the values.
- 8. Hold themselves, the team, and other members of the school community, to account for demonstrating our values.
- 9. Check in with students and teams about how they are progressing in demonstrating our values.



Embedding Values in People Processes



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Embedding the Values



To celebrate and embed our Statement of Values and overarching Philosophy in our school community, we:

- Display posters and banners that promote our vision, mission, philosophy and values in our school.
- Display the Shared Expectations around the school to remind people about them and encourage their use.
- Nominate a value to **focus on per term** and direct energy and activities on that value.
- Discuss and use the values with **students** in the **classroom**.
- Use the values as part of **curriculum development**.
- Use the values in talking about the **learning intention** for each class.
- Provide **awards** and **recognition** for students who actively demonstrate the values.
- Regularly speak about and celebrate the use of values at whole school and sub-school assemblies, school communications, classes, meetings etc.
- Discuss and use the values as part of **student leadership development** programs.

- Describe **how** the values were considered as part of making specific **decisions**.
- Use the values in **Leadership Team Meetings** to review how the value/s have been used over the preceding week by school leaders.
- Staff and students **create symbols** of each value to be displayed around the school (e.g., paint/draw pictures, artefacts made from clay, wood, paper, plasticine etc.).
- Staff and students practice using the values by working through various scenarios developed and designed to assist in understanding and using the values.
- Stories about how values are used are collected and shared amongst the whole school community.
- The **self assessment** section at the end of this booklet is used to support us reflect on our own use of the values.
